ICD-11: Key Points



- WHO publication
- Fully electronic, no books:
 - 17,000 diagnostic categories
 - Over 100,000 medical diagnostic terms
- Index-based search algorithm interprets more than 1.6 million terms

ICD-11: Key Points



- ICD 11 Fact Sheet available online
- ICD 11 is:
 - Easy to install
 - Can be used on or off-line
 - Very comprehensive
- An unknown is whether countries such as the U.S., Canada, Germany, and Australia can accept it as it is <u>without</u> an Official Modification (CM) for morbidity

What happened with ICD-10?



- US spent years developing a Clinical Modification (CM)
- Australia adopted ICD-10-AU for mortality in 1998 and for morbidity in 1999
- Canada adopted ICD-10-CA in 2000
- Germany adopted ICD-10-GM in 2000
- Some countries adopted ICD-10 as early as 1994
- The US adopted ICD-10-CM and PCS in 2015!

What caused the U.S. delay?



- U.S. added a significant number of codes in:
 - Chapter 19: Injuries, Poisoning
 - Chapter 20: Consequences of External Cause and External Causes of Morbidity
- U.S. was the last developed country to adopt

Other reasons for the CM delay



- Much detail was added to the system
- August 2008 Notice of Proposed Rulemaking published
- January 2009 Final Rule published stipulating 10/1/2013 compliance date
- September 2012 another Final Rule published delaying compliance date until 10/1/2014
- April 2013 Congress passes Protecting Access to Medicare Act prohibiting the HHS Secretary from requiring ICD-10-CM compliance before 10/1/2015





- English and Spanish versions are available online
- Many countries finished with translations—China completed work last year – reports indicate they have invested millions
- This year's Mid-year meetings will address—The WHO Education and Implementation Committee and the Morbidity Reference Group



- **Mortality:** U.S. required to implement for Underlying Cause of Death Coding (UCOD)
- Morbidity: U.S. will need to address implementation
- NCVHS convened working meeting in 2019 to obtain input from broad range of experts and stakeholders and issued recommendations aimed to support timely (i.e., unprotracted) implementation



NCVHS issued letter to Secretary in November 2019 with 3 recommendations to HHS aimed to support smoother, less costly and burdensome implementation:

- HHS conduct research to evaluate the impact of different approaches to the transition implementation of ICD-11 in the United States for mortality and morbidity classification.
- HHS provide timely leadership on strategic outreach and communications to the U.S. healthcare industry about the transition to ICD-11.
- HHS Secretary ensure appropriate federal priority, as needed, for efforts to negotiate the ICD copyright issues to ensure that copyright will not be a barrier to U.S. adoption and use of ICD-11.



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
